

Economic and political crises, ecological disasters, epidemics and global inequalities are rendering humanitarian contexts today ever more complex. Project Humanity addresses that imperative. As a teaching tool and school learning project, it focuses on spreading awareness of the Humanitarian Principles. This new teaching tool is intended to assist teachers in creating learning spaces where students are sensitized to humanitarian concerns, so that they are better able to form an opinion on the issues and thus gain greater confidence in their own capacity to act.

Activities:

- Interactive methodes to address Humanitarian Principles and the diversity of values.
- Discussion with a humanitarian aid expert.
- Mini-project management for the implementation of individual projects.
- Securing knowledge and ensuring reflexion by a personal learning diary.

Duration: One week (4.5 days) or five double lessons (Module 1-5)
